

## Important Information and Additional Costs to Consider when Choosing your Course

### Course Title: MSc Physiotherapy (Pre-Registration)

#### Desirable Experience & Skills

## Admission Professional Requirements

Before enrolling you must fully declare on the forms provided during the admissions process:

- Unfiltered criminal convictions, cautions, reprimands or warnings. For further information on unfiltered offences please see the [Disclosure and Barring Service website](#).
- Involvement in disciplinary proceedings during paid or voluntary employment or within education establishments.
- Involvement with safeguarding proceedings, social services or related organisations.
- Enrolment on a health or social work professional course at another University.

## Occupational Health Requirements

You must undertake an occupational health screen to determine your suitability to undertake the course. At HSU offers to study are subject to satisfactory screening in terms of your health and welfare before the start of your course. This is to ensure that you are physically and mentally suited to a career in health. A link to the questionnaire from our Occupation Health provider will be sent to you and forms the basis of health screening, so it is vital that all questions are answered as fully and honestly as possible. The questionnaire covers the issue of vaccinations, and it is important that students are aware that they will need to provide evidence of the vaccinations, immunity or have the full range of immunisations before they start in any clinic environment in accordance with the UK Health Security Agency guidance - you can view more information on [our website](#). Applicants must meet the costs of this check (approx. £28.50) and any subsequent costs, related to the pre-clearance stage. Any missed appointments will be charged to the student at the full price. If you have any concerns about your medical suitability, you are advised to discuss this with your General Practitioner (GP) or local healthcare provider.

## Immunisation Requirements

Health Sciences University has unique multidisciplinary clinics which attract a variety of clinicians and patients, and we actively seek new opportunities for students off campus within the NHS and private sector to enrich their clinical learning. Whilst this presents great opportunities for students, there is a risk of contracting an infection whilst on placement and vaccination helps to reduce this risk to both yourself and the public. Applicants must meet the costs of this check (approx. £22) and any subsequent immunisations that are required, price list will be sent with pre-clearance information.

## Enhanced Disclosure & Barring Service Checks

You must undertake an Enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) criminal record check once you have accepted the offer of a place on the course and prior to enrolment week.

If you have lived outside of the UK for more than six consecutive months in the last five years you must provide an overseas criminal record check.

If your DBS Enhanced Disclosure certificate contains any recorded information you must present this to [admissions@hsu.ac.uk](mailto:admissions@hsu.ac.uk).

Many placement providers require students to be on the DBS Update service, so you must apply for this within 30 days of receiving your DBS certificate. There is a small cost associated with this (approx. £13); however, it will ensure you do not miss out on valuable placement opportunities.

Students are required to declare any changes in their criminal record as soon as they occur, i.e. if they have been cautioned, reprimanded, warned, charged or convicted in relation to any criminal activity. Failure to disclose such information will result in an investigation under the institution's [Fitness to Practice Policy and Procedure](#).

## **Disability Support**

We strongly recommend that you tell us about any long-term health conditions, learning difficulty or disability you may have. This is so we can assess whether we can deliver the course in such a way that you can meet the CSP and HCPC requirements of the course and take part without disadvantage both in university and on placement.

You are encouraged to discuss any concerns about any long-term health conditions, learning difficulty or disability you may have with us before making an application for the course or accepting an offer of a place so that we can discuss with you how reasonable adjustments can be made to enable you to study on the course, however we can only make adjustments where this will not interfere with your ability to demonstrate that you have met the learning outcomes for the course, and meet the requirements of relevant Professional Statutory and Regulatory Bodies (PSRBs).

## **Placement Requirements**

You are required to undertake a minimum of 1000 hours of practice-based learning to be eligible to complete the course. There are expectations in terms of uniform/standard of dress on placement. HSU provides three polo shirts or tunics with logo and name badges for placements, you must supply your own smart navy blue trousers and flat, black shoes with a non-slip rubber sole. There is an option to buy further polo shirts and branded fleeces also. Students who choose to wear a head covering, such as a hijab, are required to provide this themselves, in a plain, professional style. You must complete any mandatory training and occupational health checks as a requirement before going on placement.

The locality of placements can take students across Dorset and Hampshire and into counties such as Wiltshire, Sussex, Berkshire, Devon and Somerset. This will incur additional costs, and you need to plan for this in your annual budget. Typically, these costs are for travel and, if necessary, accommodation to access placement. The amount of money involved will depend on the site of the placement, distance from home, and the type and length of placement. Costs of several hundred pounds can be expected, and exceptionally over £1000 per year. UK students may claim placement travel expenses, and costs towards any additional accommodation that may be required in order to access placements from the NHS support fund, but these costs are reimbursed to a threshold. Students will be expected to dress smartly and adhere to the clinic dress code when observing or working with patients in the onsite clinic. The dress code for offsite placements must be observed and in all placement settings students will be expected to maintain high standards of personal hygiene. Students must complete any mandatory training as a requirement before going on placement.

### **Other Important Information**

- There is an expectation of student to model/role play as patients for other students in practical classes and assessments. These are mixed gender groups. As well as physical contact with other students this also involves undressing down to underwear leaving the underwear on (short lycra shorts and tank tops may be worn). Students may purchase a treatment gown to wear, if they are uncomfortable wearing only their underwear/ shorts.
- Any concerns about this should be discussed with the University prior to applying for the course, and where the concerns relate to issues covered by the Equality Act 2010 (such as religion, disability, gender reassignment) reasonable adjustments can be planned where this will not interfere with the your ability to demonstrate that you have met the learning outcomes for the course, and meet the requirements of relevant Professional Statutory and Regulatory Bodies (PSRBs).
- You must declare any criminal records and changes in criminal record as soon as they occur, i.e., if you have been cautioned, reprimanded, warned, charged or convicted in relation to any criminal activity.
- Typical attendance expectations vary every semester with a mix of online and on campus learning. Typically, on-campus classes are between 9am and 5pm with 2-4 days attendance needed between Monday – Friday. This changes with assessment and resit periods, as well as placement (this will be full time hours).
- The CSP and HCPC expect high levels of attendance and engagement for all theory, practical and placement sessions and this is closely monitored and managed, with support offered to students struggling to engage, in line with the University's [Academic Engagement Policy](#).
- Students will be expected to dress appropriately for practical classes and when representing the University in the local community and on placements.
- New students must undertake the directed learning that is sent in the Autumn term regarding anatomy and physiology, and new starters must engage with the pre-course material prior to January.

### **Accommodation**

The University does not provide accommodation to students. Students are responsible for making their own accommodation arrangements while enrolled at the Health Sciences University.

The Student Services team can offer advice and assistance in finding private rented accommodation in the area.

## **Additional Costs**

Below are additional costs you will need to meet in order to fully participate in and complete your course. You will need to budget for these costs separately as they are not included in the overall Course Fee.

### ***Essential Costs***

- Costs for travelling to and from the University and any placements. You may need business use added to your car insurance policy, as standard insurance usually only covers commuting to a single place of work.
- Accommodation costs whilst studying at the University or attending placements.
- Uniform costs
- Photocopying and printing costs.
- DBS Check costs.
- Access to reliable WiFi connectivity and associated technology for remote learning
- Occupational health and vaccination costs.
- Repeat unit costs
- Course Specific Costs:
  - o Adult Stethoscope: for example, 3M™ Littmann® Lightweight II S.E. Stethoscopes (approx. £ 40.00 - £60.00).
  - o 2. 8" Plastic Goniometer £7.00 (approx..) and a tape measure.
  - o Stethoscopes and Goniometers are available from a number of online suppliers including Amazon, Medisave and Physiotherapy store.
  - o Body Markers – 6 Colours Body Painting Marker Pen Kit (washable) are available from a number of online suppliers including Amazon.

### ***Recommended Costs***

- It is recommended that you purchase a tablet or computer/laptop for your personal use, as this will enhance your learning by giving them immediate access to our Virtual Learning Environment (VLE).
- It is recommended you have a good quality Broadband internet connection when studying at home.

### ***Optional Costs***

- Teaching materials are made available in electronic format on the Virtual Learning Environment. If you wish to have a printed copy you may print these materials at your own cost.
- Core texts are available in the library but there are limited numbers, and most students buy some, but not necessarily all, textbooks.

- We are unable to offer any storage facilities for personal belongings of students, except for a limited number of lockers. You can rent a locker from the Health Sciences University Students' Union (HSUSU) on payment of a single fee of £10.
- There may be other costs for activities which will enhance your time here but are not directly related to your course. For example, there is an annual fee (currently £70) to join our gym (gym membership is a requirement to join some HSUSU/Health Sciences University sports societies). Some HSUSU-organised social events and activities organised through HSUSU Societies will be at an additional cost.
- On successful completion of the course, you have the option to attend the graduation ceremony. Students choosing to attend must meet the cost of hiring academic dress for the ceremony; wearing of academic dress at the ceremony is compulsory. The academic dress is provided by an external company. In 2023 the hire cost was £38. There are no other charges to the graduate for the graduation ceremony. However, additional tickets for family members and friends are chargeable per head, you will be advised of the price before you graduate.
- You will be provided with transcripts for each year of study along with a diploma supplement and degree certificate upon completion of your course of study. If you require a replacement of any of these documents, there will be a fee payable as set out below:
  - Transcript (per academic year): £10
  - Degree Certificate: £40
  - Diploma Supplement: £10
